

## Argus fish (Scatophagus argus)

The Argus fish, commonly known as the *\*Spotted Scat\** or *\*Spotted Butterfish\** (Scatophagus argus), is a species of fish belonging to the family Scatophagidae. It is found in the Indo-Pacific region, including coastal waters, estuaries, and sometimes freshwater environments. Here's a detailed description:

- *\*Size\**: Typically grows to about 30 cm (12 inches) in length, though some individuals can reach up to 38 cm (15 inches).

- *\*Coloration\**: The body is silvery with numerous dark spots, which can vary in size and density. The spots are more prominent in younger fish and may fade slightly with age.

### Habitat:

- *\*Range\**: Found in the Indo-Pacific, from the Red Sea and East Africa to the Pacific Islands, including Japan, Australia, and the Philippines.
- *\*Environment\**: Prefers brackish waters such as estuaries, mangroves, and coastal lagoons, but can also adapt to freshwater and marine environments.

### Behavior:

- *\*Diet\**: Omnivorous, feeding on algae, small invertebrates, detritus, and occasionally small fish.
- *\*Temperament\**: Generally peaceful but can be territorial, especially in confined spaces.
- *\*Reproduction\**: Spawns in marine environments, with larvae migrating to estuaries and mangroves to grow.

### Aquarium Care:

- *\*Tank Size\**: Requires a large tank (at least 75 gallons) due to its size and active nature.
- *\*Water Conditions\**: Prefers brackish water with a salinity of 1.005–1.015 SG, but can adapt to freshwater. pH should be between 7.5–8.5, and temperature between 22–28°C (72–82°F).
- *\*Compatibility\**: Can be kept with other brackish water species of similar size and temperament. Avoid very small fish, as they may be seen as prey.

### Interesting Facts:

- The name Scatophagus means "dung-eater," as it was once believed to feed on human waste, though this is not its primary diet.
- It is a hardy species, making it popular among aquarists interested in brackish water setups.
